In the message, in specially selected Scripture readings, and in carefully crafted songs, prayers, and creeds, the liturgy proclaims the good news about Jesus from start to finish. Gospel-centered worship is also designed to include the participation of the entire assembly (including children).

~ Service Notes ~ The Transfiguration of our Lord

For more than 500 years, the Church has celebrated the Sunday known as the Festival of the Transfiguration. Martin Luther's pastor, Johannes Bugenhagen, and Veit Deitrich began the practice of celebrating Transfiguration between Epiphany and Lent. The word "transfiguration" simply means "a change in appearance." It refers to the account in the Gospel for today when Jesus shone forth in all his heavenly glory as the Son of God.

Jesus gave his disciples a glimpse of his glory because the cross was coming. Jesus left that mountain and headed to Jerusalem where he would suffer, die, and rise again for all mankind. This morning's glimpse of glory teaches us that Jesus didn't endure the cross because he was forced to. He endured the cross because he chose to!



Transfiguration Sunday ends the season of Epiphany. When we next meet it will be the season of Lent, a time of reflection on our Savior's suffering. So, on this day, we say our last "Alleluias" until the Day of Resurrection and join in Peter's cry, "It's good that we are here!"

Heavenly Father, who on the mountainside revealed Jesus Christ in his unveiled divine glory, and by wonderful testimony out of the cloud declared him your Son whom you love, help us always to believe and confess that Jesus is God, to the glory of your name. ORDER OF SERVICE

Throughout the seasons of the church year, there are different Sundays that are set aside as special. These Sundays are called "Festival Sundays." ¹ The word Kyrie is a Greek word from the phrase *Kyrie Elieson* which means, "Lord, have mercy!" This is the most heartfelt cry of a believer to his Lord. It is not a cry for forgiveness, but a cry for mercy that our Lord and king hear us and help us in our necessities and trouble. Christians have been praying the Kyrie at Sunday worship for more than 1700 years (that's why its name is Greek, the language most commonly spoken at the time).

First Reading | 2 Kings 2:1-12 |

When the LORD was about to take Elijah up to heaven in a whirlwind, Elijah and Elisha were on their way from Gilgal. ² Elijah said to Elisha, "Stay here; the LORD has sent me to Bethel."

But Elisha said, "As surely as the LORD lives and as you live, I will not leave you." So they went down to Bethel.

³The company of the prophets at Bethel came out to Elisha and asked, "Do you know that the LORD is going to take your master from you today?"

"Yes, I know," Elisha replied, "so be quiet."

⁴Then Elijah said to him, "Stay here, Elisha; the LORD has sent me to Jericho." And he replied, "As surely as the LORD lives and as you live, I will not leave you." So they went to Jericho.

⁵The company of the prophets at Jericho went up to Elisha and asked him, "Do you know that the LORD is going to take your master from you today?"

"Yes, I know," he replied, "so be quiet."

⁶Then Elijah said to him, "Stay here; the LORD has sent me to the Jordan."

And he replied, "As surely as the LORD lives and as you live, I will not leave you." So the two of them walked on.

⁷Fifty men from the company of the prophets went and stood at a distance, facing the place where Elijah and Elisha had stopped at the Jordan. ⁸Elijah took his cloak, rolled it up and struck the water with it. The water divided to the right and to the left, and the two of them crossed over on dry ground.

⁹When they had crossed, Elijah said to Elisha, "Tell me, what can I do for you before I am taken from you?"


"Let me inherit a double portion of your spirit," Elisha replied.

¹⁰ "You have asked a difficult thing," Elijah said, "yet if you see me when I am taken from you, it will be yours—otherwise, it will not."

¹¹ As they were walking along and talking together, suddenly a chariot of fire and horses of fire appeared and separated the two of them, and Elijah went up to heaven in a whirlwind. ¹² Elisha saw this and cried out, "My father! My father! The chariots and horsemen of Israel!" And Elisha saw him no more.

⁷ Then a cloud appeared and covered them, and a voice came from the cloud: "This is my Son, whom I love. Listen to him!"

⁸ Suddenly, when they looked around, they no longer saw anyone with them except Jesus.



⁹ As they were coming down the mountain, Jesus gave them orders not to tell anyone what they had seen until the Son of Man had risen from the dead.

Confession of Faith | Nicene Creed |

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation, he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the virgin Mary, and became fully human. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate. He suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who in unity with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. We believe in one Holy Christian and apostolic church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.

For centuries, therefore, the Christian churches have omitted their most jubilant songs during this season, including the word Alleluia, which means, "Praise the Lord." Now for a time we say farewell to alleluia. We do this to prepare ourselves for the quitter days of Lent. The alleluias will return on Easter dawn as we gather to shout our praise to the risen Lord.

- Wenesday, March 24th, 6:30pm, Brick Row



Communion at Huntersville Lutheran

We believe what God's Word says. God's Word clearly teaches that along with the bread and wine we receive Christ's body and blood for the forgiveness of sins (Matthew 26:26, 28; Mark 14:22, 24; Luke 22:19-22). Communion is important to us at Huntersville Lutheran and we seek to honor the biblical view of communion. Before coming up for communion, all adults should ask themselves these questions:

- 1. Do you confess your sins and seek to turn away from the sins you confessed?
- 2. Do you recognize that Jesus' sacrifice on the cross is the only way sin is forgiven?
- 3. Do you recognize that in the Sacrament of Communion you receive Jesus' true body and blood along with the bread and the wine?
- 4. Do you believe that the Bible *IS* God's inspired Word and does not just contain some truths of God?
- 5. Do you believe that Huntersville Lutheran Church teaches only the truth of God based on His inspired Word? (A summary of these teachings is taught in Faithbuilders, a class that runs multiple times throughout the year.).

We ask that those who have not had the opportunity to understand our Scriptural confession and are unsure of the answers to the above questions would speak with the pastor before participating in the Lord's Supper this morning. It is our sincere desire to share in the blessings of the Lord's Supper with you according to the pattern Jesus himself has given in his Word.
