Service Notes | The Season of Advent |

Advent is a Latin word that means "coming." The season of Advent is the four-week period before Christmas that the church uses to remember the "coming" of Christ as the savior of the world.

Today's Theme | The Forerunner Points |


Since the fall into sin, God has been moving, promising, acting, and pointing to one thing—the salvation he would win through the coming Messiah. When John the Baptizer, the forerunner, arrived, he faithfully and humbly carried out his calling—he pointed people forward. But people weren't satisfied with John or his message. They weren't satisfied about what he was pointing to.



Can the same be said about us? Are we satisfied with what Christmas points us to—the Light that dispels the darkness of our sin? Or, would we be more satisfied if Christmas was only a little religious; a little more lights and gifts than the manager and worship? What do we want for Christmas?




ORDER OF SERVICE

Normally, no hymn of praise is sung during Advent and Lent. This practice accentuates the solemn and penitential nature of these seasons. This Advent, the Gloria is replaced by the gathering rite for the season. At the heart of this gathering rite is thought of waiting. The season of Advent is marked by waiting in anticipation for the coming of God's Son in flesh and blood to be our Savior. It is in him we hope. It is for him we wait. It is to him we pray, "Come quickly, Lord."

Confession


L The Lord Jesus comes to us and offers his grace and love. It is good for us to repent of our sins and to plead for his mercy.



Children's Message


First Reading | Isaiah 61:1-3, 10, 11 |

The Spirit of the Sovereign LORD is on me, because the LORD has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim freedom for the captives and release from darkness for the prisoners, ² to proclaim the year of the LORD's favor and the day of vengeance of our God, to comfort all who mourn, and provide for those who grieve in Zionto bestow on them a crown of beauty instead of ashes, the oil of joy instead of mourning, and a garment of praise instead of a spirit of despair.

They will be called oaks of righteousness, a planting of the LORD for the display of his splendor." ¹⁰ I delight greatly in the LORD; my soul rejoices in my God. For he has clothed me with garments of salvation and arrayed me in a robe of his righteousness, as a bridegroom adorns his head like a priest, and as a bride adorns herself with her jewels. ¹¹ For as the soil makes the sprout come up and a garden causes seeds to grow, so the Sovereign LORD will make righteousness and praise spring up before all nations.

Lighting Rite¹

Please Stand.

- L We light two Advent candles remember Jesus, who came in history. He came into a world of sin and death.
- **G** We remember Jesus, who came as the promised Messiah. John the Baptist prepared the way of the Lord.
- L We hear John's call to repent. In our repentance, we cling to the one whom Isaiah says will cloth us in garments of salvation and array us in robes of his righteousness. In him we place our hope.
- **G** We light two Advent candles as a sign of our repentance and desire for renewal.
- Come quickly, Lord Jesus, come.

The Congregation Sings:

 O Come, our Dayspring from on high And cheer us by your drawing nigh; Disperse the gloomy clouds of night, And deaths dark shadow put to flight. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to you, O Israel.

¹ The Advent Wreath is a combination of two very common symbols: light and the fir tree. From the early centuries of Christianity, it has been the practice to represent Christ by a burning candle. The fir tree has a long history of religious use. No doubt the Advent Wreath was suggested by the Christmas tree. It seems that the Advent Wreath originated a few hundred years ago among the Lutherans of eastern Germany. A wreath of evergreens, made in various sizes, was either suspended from the ceiling or placed on a table. Four candles representing the four Sundays of Advent were fastened to the wreath. Eventually the use of the Advent Wreath became widespread and moved also from the home into the church. The general symbolism of the Advent Wreath lies in the growing light of the wreath, increasing each week as we approach the birthday of Jesus, the Light of the world.

The Gospel

L The Gospel, according to John, chapter one.

There was a man sent from God whose name was John. ⁷He came as a witness to testify concerning that light, so that through him all might believe. ⁸He himself was not the light; he came only as a witness to the light.

¹⁹ Now this was John's testimony when the Jewish leaders in Jerusalem sent priests and Levites to ask him who he was. ²⁰ He did not fail to confess, but confessed freely, "I am not the Messiah."

²¹ They asked him, "Then who are you? Are you Elijah?"

He said, "I am not."

"Are you the Prophet?"

He answered, "No."

²² Finally they said, "Who are you? Give us an answer to take back to those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?"

²³ John replied in the words of Isaiah the prophet, "I am the voice of one calling in the wilderness, 'Make straight the way for the Lord.'"

²⁴ Now the Pharisees who had been sent ²⁵ questioned him, "Why then do you baptize if you are not the Messiah, nor Elijah, nor the Prophet?"

²⁶ "I baptize with water," John replied, "but among you stands one you do not know. ²⁷ He is the one who comes after me, the straps of whose sandals I am not worthy to untie."

²⁸ This all happened at Bethany on the other side of the Jordan, where John was baptizing.

Confession of Faith | *Nicene Creed* |

Then he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying, "Drink from it all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is poured out for you for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, whenever you drink it, it remembrance of me.



Communion at Huntersville Lutheran

We believe what God's Word says. God's Word clearly teaches that along with the bread and wine we receive Christ's body and blood for the forgiveness of sins (Matthew 26:26, 28; Mark 14:22, 24; Luke 22:19-22). Communion is important to us at Huntersville Lutheran and we seek to honor the biblical view of communion. Before coming up for communion, all adults should ask themselves these questions:

- 1. Do you confess your sins and seek to turn away from the sins you confessed?
- 2. Do you recognize that Jesus' sacrifice on the cross is the only way sin is forgiven?
- 3. Do you recognize that in the Sacrament of Communion you receive Jesus' true body and blood along with the bread and the wine?
- 4. Do you believe that the Bible *IS* God's inspired Word and does not just contain some truths of God?
- 5. Do you believe that Huntersville Lutheran Church teaches only the truth of God based on His inspired Word? (A summary of these teachings is taught in Faithbuilders, a class that runs multiple times throughout the year.).

We ask that those who have not had the opportunity to understand our Scriptural confession and are unsure of the answers to the above questions would speak with the pastor before participating in the Lord's Supper this morning. It is our sincere desire to share in the blessings of the Lord's Supper with you according to the pattern Jesus himself has given in his Word.
